Mayoral Candidate Questions Jay Beckby

As an individual seeking an elected seat to represent our community, how will you help to shape a positive, growth-oriented narrative for Hastings?

As a leader in the army national guard I was trained to use combat multipliers to increase success on the battlefield. As an infantry unit we would use tools like artillery, armor, and close air support. As an elected leader I would use this same philosophy and call them economic multipliers. Reliable power provided by our own utility company, two intersecting railroad lines, easy access to highways and interstate, central U.S. location, and two colleges providing both professional and skilled trade talent are key.
